School Major Grant Summer Experiences Through Reading

In this manner, not only do students have a positive experience with a book, but they also deepen interests and knowledge.

A major grant will help Brookfield CARES bring acclaimed writer, comedian, and mental health activist Kevin Breel to Brookfield High School. Kevin addresses his personal struggle with depression in an engaging manner, encouraging young audience members to advocate for themselves in the vital

issue of mental health. This presentation, given during the day for students and in the evening for parents and community members, aims to act as a springboard to open dialogue on the issue of mental health throughout the Brookfield community.

Community/School Mini-Grant US Map at Huckleberry Hill Elementary

A mini-grant was awarded to Girl Scout and high school senior Paige Peck for the creation of a map of the United States on the Huckleberry Hill Elementary blacktop. Developing this initiative for her Girl Scout Gold Star project, Paige wanted to both provide a visual aid for learning and promote physical fitness. Paige additionally created booklets for the HHES teachers which detailed a variety of geography-oriented games utilizing the map, and taught these games to several of the classes.



Community Mini-Grant Emily Dickinson at the Brookfield Library

A mini-grant will allow the Brookfield Library to present "Inside Emily Dickinson: Her Poetry and Her Life". Created and performed by actress Ginger Grace, this inspiring biographical portrait is based on the letters, life stories, and poems of Emily Dickinson. In the course of the show, Ms. Grace reaches out to the audience for ideas, words and phrases, and with their input, new poems are created. The program exposes the audience not only to Emily Dickinson, but also to poetry in general and the joys of creativity.
